grace in enabling the opportunity. For those which have already fallen by the wayside, I soberly reflect on human frailty as being overly ambitious and proud, my own in particular, and God's grace in loving me anyway. So much so, that Christ gave his life for me, as for us all.

Perhaps I'm better served in fact by experiencing the humility of failure than the triumph of achievement. This is some consolation for those of us who try but can't quite manage to transform ourselves into a better, fitter, more faithful human being by our own efforts alone.

If you have taken up a Lenten discipline of some kind and are still going strong, may I encourage you to continue. For those who have tried, and it has not gone so well so far, may I encourage you to try again. And if that doesn't work, please receive the consolation of the previous paragraph. I shall find out when you are reading this, whether or not I am being consoled alongside you.

Wherever your Lenten journey takes you, however, whatever you learn about yourself and the God who loves you, may it have serious benefits leading to much Easter joy.

'Be vigilant' say police after spate of car crime

Graffham motorists are being warned to be extra vigilant after a spate of vehicle crime in recent weeks, with one car stolen, a window of a second smashed with valuables left inside stolen and a van broken into while parked outside The Cricketers pub in Duncton.

The spree started on the afternoon of Saturday 27 January when thieves stole a Volvo XC60 parked outside the Empire Hall, while the owner had popped inside the building.

A few days later, on Tuesday 6 February between 2.15 and 3.15pm, another car had its side window smashed while parked in the car park to the north of Graffham Rec, with the vandals stealing a handbag that had been left inside.

Later that same day, a van parked outside The Cricketers pub at Duncton was also broken into and two briefcases of paperwork snatched.

The police are reminding drivers to ensure they lock their vehicles, keep valuables out of sight if they are unable to remove them from the vehicle and store remote car keys away from doors and windows, ideally in a 'Faraday Bag'.

Separately, seven incidents of stolen vehicle number plates have been reported across the police's Chichester district, including at Midhurst and Wisborough Green.

£500 raised in days for security cameras at school

A crowd surfing fund raiser to collect cash to pay for security cameras covering the approaches to Graffham Infant School hit its ± 500 target in a matter of days.

The project was launched by Graffham's Stuart Gerrett, father of two boys attending the school, with the school itself.

It follows an incident late last year in which two cars, owned by fellow parents, were broken into one afternoon and items stolen from the vehicles.

A few years ago, the windows of another car were smashed by robbers while the owner was attending a service at St Giles Church, across the road from the school. Earlier still, thieves syphoned off heating oil from the school's tank.

Stuart said: "The monitoring system will help increase security around this valuable part of our lovely village and hopefully act as a deterrent to future criminal activity outside the school. Thanks to all the generous donors for supporting the appeal."

Empire Hall fitted with new audio visual system

The Empire Hall was kitted out last month with its own new state-of-the-art audio visual system, complete with a three-metre powered screen, high definition projector and high quality loudspeakers.

The equipment gives the village's 'grand old lady' capability to screen films, live sports, national events and other television programmes. It can also be used by the many clubs and societies that use the hall to host quiz nights, talks and the like.

Graffham Empire Movies is aiming to be among the first in the village to take advantage of the new equipment, using it for its first film night since before the pandemic (see next page).

The sound system comes complete with a hearing loop and a radio microphone, making it ideal for talks and announcements.

The project cost around $\pounds 15,000$ – funded thanks to a grant from the Lottery Foundation.

The system was installed by Sussex-based specialists MJ Visual, which has an enviable



track record for fitting similar technology in cathedrals and churches, universities and offices, village halls and other public buildings throughout the South.

Before finalising the specification, an Empire Hall sub-committee visited a number of other venues in the county to assess the equipment installed there.

Empire Hall Management Committee Chairman Sally Blunt said: "This will make Graffham's wonderful Empire Hall an even more valuable asset for our community. Very many thanks to everyone involved in bringing it to fruition."

The new AV system is the latest improvement made to the Empire Hall, following the installation of ultrafast broadband complete with new wifi routers.

Graffham Empire Movies returns - with Wonka

The silver screen makes a welcome return to the village next month with the first of what is hoped to be regular 'pop-up' events by Graffham Empire Movies (GEM) after a four-year interval – thanks to installation of the Empire Hall's new audio visual system (see previous page).

The first film to be shown in GEM's new incarnation – on Friday 12 April – will be the newly released family-friendly blockbuster *Wonka*, based on Roald Dahl's long-time favourite book *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*.

It will be the village's first movie night since the pandemic. Future screenings will depend on the audience response. GEM Chairman Michael Blunt said: "GEM had been in operation for many years with the twin aims of bringing the cinema to our village and raising funds for our magnificent Empire Hall – but the costs of hiring in the equipment that used to be needed meant achieving any kind of profit became increasingly challenging. The growth of movie streaming services like Netflix and Amazon Prime hit our attendance – and then of course Covid meant all cinemas had to go into complete hibernation.

"Many people locally have been asking when GEM might return – and the Empire Hall's amazing new high quality equipment now makes this possible. We'll be starting off with occasional 'pop-up' screenings at first, to gauge interest before committing to a regular schedule – and to see if there is anyone out there willing to help with organising things and choosing which movies to show.

"The film we've chosen for our re-opening, *Wonka*, should appeal to all ages – it's real fun escapism with a terrific cast, beautifully filmed and with catchy songs."

Created by the team behind the popular *Paddington* movies, *Wonka* is a musical fantasy starring Timothée Chalamet in the title role, with an allstar casting including Rowan Atkinson, Jim Carter, Olivia Coleman, Hugh Grant, Sally Hawkins and Matt Lucas. Released just before Christmas, one reviewer described it as "2023's most enjoyable hit". With a PG rating, it runs for one hour 56 minutes.

No advance booking is needed – just turn up on the night. Doors open at 6pm with the screening starting at 6.30pm. Refreshments available before the film and during the interval. Admission is just $\pounds 10$ for adults and $\pounds 5$ for under 18s. All payments by card/contactless only, please.

Every one of the 125 seats was booked, with a lengthy waiting list, as the performers received a standing ovation.

Comedy troupe Spitz and Co made a welcome return to the Empire Hall, on 2 February, with their latest rendition *Elvis in Blue Hawaii* bringing tears of laughter to the packed audience.

Forthcoming events at the Empire Hall include its Easter Market (see pages 3-6) and the return of Graffham Empire Movies (see pages 8-9).

Burns Night reeled by car theft and punctures

Many of those attending had brushed up their dancing skills at the dance practice sessions organised in the hall on Sundays throughout January, led by Susie Tink's

daughter Vikki Burcombe. After David Garrard addressed the haggis as usual and Philip Trower sang one of Burns' best known songs *My Love is Like a Red Red Rose* and gave a short tribute to one of the main founders of Graffham's Burns' Night tradition, Maggie Paterson, who sadly passed away shortly after last year's event, the near 60 dancers tucked into the traditional haggis, neeps and tatties at tables beautifully decorated by Karin Skanberg.

The event, masterminded by Clive and Harriet Rowntree, raised nearly £900 for the Empire Hall. Next year's Burns' Night will be a week earlier than usual – on Saturday 18 January. Mark the date in your diary now!

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Planning matters

Norwood Lane storage containers refused An application for retrospective planning permission for the siting of two shipping containers in a field at the southern end of East Lavington's Norwood Lane has been turned down by South Downs National Park (SDN) and Chichester District Council (CDC). The applicants had said they needed the units to store equipment used for woodland management. The planning authorities ruled: "Insufficient information has been submitted to demonstrate a need for the containers and, as such, the development would result in the unjustified encroachment of development into the countryside which would be harmful to the character and appearance of the rural area, would fail to conserve or enhance the relative tranquillity of the rural location."

Garage for Ripples approved Plans to build a garage in the garden alongside Ripples in The Street, Graffham, have been approved by SDNP and CDC.

It was with great sadness that we learned just as this edition was going to press of the passing on Tuesday 13 February of Anthea Hodgetts, at her home at Thorney in The Street, where she lived for many years with her late husband Clifford. Her funeral will be held at St Giles Church on Tuesday 5 March at 12.30pm when she will be laid to rest alongside Clifford in the churchyard. A full tribute is planned for a future edition.

RIP Ron, Graffham's last surviving evacuee

Ron Probert, believed to be the last survivor of the 120 plus evacuees housed in Graffham during World War II passed away on 1 February, aged 95. His funeral will be on Thursday 7 March at 1pm at Arun Crematorium, Grevatts Lane, Yapton. Born on 9 November 1928, he was ten when he left home in London with his mother Maude and younger brother Derek to take a train to rural Sussex on Sunday 3 September 1939 – the day war was declared between Britain and Germany. He spent what he described as "the three most memorable years of my life" in Graffham before returning to the capital to start full-time work, aged 14, joining his father who had remained there building vital military supplies.

While here, the three evacuees were billeted with gamekeeper Ernest King, his wife Hilda and their son Ronny at one of the two semi-detached Barnetts Cottages, which

were recently demolished to make way for a new-build house, in Barnetts Lea Woods. The two families remained life-long closest of friends.

Ron attended Graffham School, walking the five miles there and back every day, in all weathers. He earned pocket money working at local farms.

In an interview with *Graffham Parish News* in late 2022, he remembered: "At first we all slept in a brick shed in the garden, as an air raid shelter. When we were allowed back in the house, five of us shared a bedroom. The toilet

was outside, with the *Daily Mirror* for lavatory paper. The only bath we'd have was outside too, in a trough filled with rainwater, once a week at most. All our drinking, cooking and washing water came from a spring in the woods and cooking was on a range burning wood we'd cut by hand – no electricity or mains drainage."

After the war, Ron served in the London Fire Brigade. When he married Edna in 1954, they spent part of their honeymoon back in Graffham, at Fitzlea. He retired in the 1990s to Bersted, near Chichester, before seeing out his days at Middletonon-Sea, returning regularly to Graffham. He is survived by daughter Sharon and two grandchildren.

From Town Hall: Car park charges, dogs and sheep

Our representative on Chichester District Council, John Cross, provides his regular update on his key issues of focus right now.



A number of local residents have raised with me the recent decision by Chichester District Council to increase parking charges. Nobody wishes them to be raised, even though it is by less than inflation, but any responsible council must make sure its budget balances.

This present council inherited a budget in good order and intends to continue that track record. Inflation's increased, and, like everyone, the council costs have increased. That extra money must be found from somewhere.

Chichester District Council, like every local authority, has had little or no increase in funding from central government for years, and we do not wish to be in the

same situation as many other councils, of all political colours, in going bankrupt. This modest increase in parking charges was one of several steps taken that will help to keep the council's budget healthy.

I end with a reminder to dog walkers in our countryside community that this is the time of year when sheep are lambing so you need to be extra alert as to what your



pet is doing. I have already heard of some horrible cases where farmers have lost sheep through dog attacks, but also of flocks of sheep that have been harassed by dogs, which can also be fatal to pregnant ewes.

A seemingly placid obedient dog can sometimes gallop off and cause great harm, so best to keep dogs on leads where livestock are around. A farmer is within his rights to shoot any dog that is attacking or harassing his flocks.

Nature Notes: Team players from cradle to grave

A regular column by Sussex naturalist and wildlife guide Michael Blencowe, who can regularly be spotted in and around Graffham.

With winter in the rear view mirror, the English countryside starts to get noisy and active – nothing exemplifies this re-awakening energy quite like a rookery in springtime.

The first sound that a new born rook hears is other rooks. Lots of them. It's a sound that will surround it every day for the rest of its life. Rooks are one of our most sociable birds. They'll live, love, feed and fight together – team players from the rookery to the grave.

In a past life my walk to work took me past a rookery near my local railway station and I'd always pause each day to look up at the community of messy twig nests above me. There's a definite pleasure to be had from watching a rookery – the sort of pleasure you get from pulling up a deckchair in the garden and watching a neighbour hard at work. High in the trees the rooks are busy – carrying twigs back to their nests, building their nests, stealing twigs from their neighbour's nest when he's not looking, getting into a fight with the neighbour when they're caught. It's a tree-top soap opera.

It can be easy to dismiss them as unattractive, plain black birds with a croaky call that sounds like Tom Waits coughing up a hairball. But look closer and you'll see the rook's plumage contains a hidden beauty – an iridescent sheen which gives the bird a flash of exotic purple and green. Loose feathers hang low to their knees like a pair of baggy shorts, the sort favoured by teen skateboarders or middle-aged men

who listen to The Foo Fighters.

Sure, that raucous 'KAAH' may not rival the nightingale's song but the communal cacophony gives constant reassurance to every individual rook that it belongs within the team. That call also helps rooks communicate the best local areas for feeding – the discovery of a wormfilled field is noisily shared to ensure that all can join in the feast. This teamwork is one way to tell them apart from their

similar looking but anti-social relative the carrion crow. Any rook on its own is a crow. If you see a group of crows they're rooks.

Outside the nesting season and away from the rookeries the birds gather each evening to roost. Rooks from all across the landscape and converge to form a superflock of hundreds or even thousands of birds. Jackdaws, their smaller relatives, join

in the party and this black cloud whirls across the sky, a crazy, cackling, cawing

celebration of all things crow. As winter draws to an end this nightly ritual dissipates and rooks return to their rookeries, start collecting (and stealing) twigs and prepare themselves for the arrival of another generation of comrades in baggy shorts.

When I used to watch my local rookery, I'd often look down from the railway bridge to platform two and see the crowd of commuters awaiting the London train - a flock of people all living similar lives but without any interaction whatsoever between them. Sometimes I'm sure I'd catch one of them looking up at the wonderful chaos of the rookery above, no doubt wondering what it's like to never feel alone.

Graffham Chronicles: Graffham Archive

In her regular column, village historian Pauline Goodwin this month looks at how a dedicated group of villagers have, over time, been preserving our community history.

A popular modern-day activity is researching family ancestry. The Graffham Archive has more requests about ancestry than any other and often the Graffham Parish Council passes on requests it receives from the general public. Digging into our past seems to provide a satisfying sense of fulfilment.

From its early beginnings in 1979 the role of the Graffham Archive has gone far beyond this. Daphne Taylor, a Graffham resident from 1961 until her recent passing, was the instigator and original Keeper of the Archive. In a 1989 article, the Midhurst and Petworth Observer reported Daphne as saying: "We want it to be an on-going archive, not just looking back at the past."

During the late 1970s and early 1980s, archives were being formed across the county with the National Archive and those of local authorities. It was a legal requirement to do so, as dictated by Local Government (Records) Acts of 1962 and 1972. The Local Government Association sets out why archives are important in its *Introduction to Archives* for councils. It declares: "Archives help to bring people together, introduces them to new ideas... instils a sense of pride in communities... improves quality of life... plays a vital role in the physical and mental wellbeing of communities."

In Graffham, the initial drive to begin an archive had a more practical prompt. Daphne recalled: "In 1979, when we discovered someone had consigned an old shepherd's smock to the bonfire, we felt that such stuff ought to be collected and preserved, along with family records."

In an attempt to build up the archive and to encourage village participation, Daphne and her committee "sent out letters to every house in the village, asking to borrow old documents, held exhibitions for the West Sussex Archives Society and a did a lot of work with the school."

At first the Graffham Archive committee was an autonomous sub-committee of the parish council but as the years rolled by it has become a totally independent body run by village enthusiasts – an organisation that exists for the village. President Abraham Lincoln's words describe its ownership and governance most aptly: "Of the people, for the people, by the people." According to minutes held in the archive,

its committee comprised a small number of members for the first 20 years who often served for a decade or so. Long serving members included Averil Beevor, Kate Bertram, Richard Challen, Angela Connor, Michael Harmer, Diana Kingsmill, Stuart Le Fevre and Rosemary Robson. Initially, the archive was stored in the Kennedy Room at the Empire Hall, which used to be the village library.

Everything was done on a shoestring budget. Apart from silver collections at the various exhibitions, a notable influx of funds came in the form of donations in 1990 of £220 from the parish council and £210 from the Guillod Trust. But by February 1996, the Archive had less than £30 to its name, with funding needed to renovate the items it already held and to provide storage for the slide collection donated by Bill Moore. It was agreed to hold raffles at school open days, with the two queens of all Graffham raffles, Flo Loader and Nellie Simmons, enlisted to sell tickets.

Local archival work escalated dramatically from the humble shepherd's smock to ancient records of local estates. From the very beginning, the Graffham Archive Committee worked in tandem with the West Sussex Record Office.

Daphne and her committees ran the Archive for almost 17 years after which Terry Daly and Diana White took control for 13 years until 2019. During Terry and Diana's tenure, the archive was moved in 2006 to the village school.

One offshoot of their work was the book Graffham: Memories, Articles, Photos produced by Diana with Mary Butterworth in 2015, and still available via Amazon.

to ever be equalled.

Robin Brind was enlisted as Archivist Julv in 2019. "Enlisted" is the key word as it seems that Robin was the most surprised of all to take over the mantle of Keeper of the Archive. On his regular dog walks, he would occasionally meet Terry Daly. Robin recalls: "We rarely spoke much except to remark

about the weather or comment on our dogs' behaviour and health." One day, Terry stopped Robin and said he had heard that he might be interested in taking over the Archive. Robin reminded Terry that he was new to the village and knew nothing about the village's history. However, Robin agreed to visit the archive. He met Terry and Diana there on 26 July 2019, and after half an hour they gave Robin the keys and left! Robin says: "Hey presto, I was the Archivist! Actually, I love it, just wish I had more time to deal with it."

Robin continues to liaise with the West Sussex Records Office, providing them with items such as every monthly edition of *Graffham Parish News*. As Keeper of the

Archive, Robin does a vast amount of research for articles in this magazine. Whereas memories are precious, historians like to see hard facts back up statements. Robin has overseen an innovative development within the archive during his tenure which is the digitalisation of archival content. This is an on-going process and Robin takes responsibility for most of the digitalisation – although he still values hard copies of documents which ensure the information contained within them will remain accessible for centuries to come.

The quantity of material in the archive has increased

and the project has grown in scale since those early days. Accessibility of the archive has always been an issue. Back in 2001, Maurice Bradley suggested that archival collections of slides should be put together for local families to borrow. Twenty years later, in 2021, Ginny Barrett approached Jonathan Simons to ask if it was technically possible to put the Graffham Archive online. Jonathan had already become interested in the archive after seeing an exhibition in the early 2000s at the Empire Hall. The website was up and running by Christmas of that year with 657 items online. Visit it at graffhamarchive.co.uk

The Archive is already a remarkable resource and it is good to see it moving forward, achieving those Local Government goals by building a sense of community.

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Bill's bygones: Farewell Adam, herbs, weekenders

A regular feature in which joint editor Bill Barrett looks back at what was happening in the village and the wider world this month in the past.

10 years ago – March 2014: Possible options to solve the accident blackspot at the turning to Graffham on the Duncton Straight are discussed at Graffham Parish Council. After seven years, Adam Mordue calls it a day as landlord of the White Horse, which closes for refurbishment. *A Hard Day at the Orifice* is the Parish Breakfast topic at the Foresters, with the speaker Ginny Kingsmill. The new leisure and community centre at the Grange opens. Russia annexes Crimea. The first same-sex weddings take place in England and Wales. Deaths of Labour politician Tony Benn (88), actor James Ellis (*Z Cars*), scriptwriter Bob Larbey (*The Good Life*, 79) and Clarissa Dickson Wright (*Two Fat Ladies*, 66).

25 years ago – March 1999: Plans for a lychgate at St Giles' are approved. PC Rob Knight attends a Graffham Parish Council meeting to discuss the problem of parents driving up to the school too quickly. Sci-fi blockbuster *The Matrix* is released. UK number 1 single is Cher's *Strong Enough*. Deaths of John G Steele, teacher at Graffham school from 1952-1963 and founder of the Men's Forum (86), singer Dusty Springfield (59), violinist Yehudi Menuhin (82), film director Stanley Kubrick (70) and comedians Ernie Wise (73) and Rod Hull (and therefore also Emu) (63).

50 years ago – March 1974: The better turnout of Graffham (76%) than Heyshott (71%) voters at the recent election is attributed to the latter's higher number of "weekenders". Two recent accidents at the bottom of Church Hill are blamed on drivers doing more than 30 mph. The Petworth Society is founded. Three-day week restrictions are lifted. An attempt to kidnap Princess Anne is foiled in London. British Airways is created through the merger of BOAC and BEA. Imperial Japanese Army 2nd Lieutenant Hiroo Onoda surrenders in the Philippines after being persuaded by his former commanding officer that World War II had ended 29 years previously. The Terracotta Army is discovered in Xi'an, China. Wolves beat Manchester City 2-1 to win the League Cup. Red Rum wins his second Grand National. Deaths of villagers Miss Florence Hysom (81), of the Homes of Rest, and Miss Joyce Townend (71), of Stuart's Meadow.
