Woodcote planning decision due by 1 August

The South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) says it will decide by 1 August whether to allow The Woodcote to triple in size. Graffham Parish Council is urging it to refuse permission. As this edition went to press, more than 110 public comments had been submitted to SDNPA, ahead of its 23 June deadline – extended from the original 3 June date – with all but five of them opposing the proposal.

The SDNPA's planning committee is due to meet next on Thursday 10 July at 10am at South Downs Centre Hall, Midhurst. Whether The Woodcote will be on the agenda will not be confirmed until the agenda is posted five days ahead of the meeting. Members of the public are able to attend – or you can watch the meeting live or by 'catch-up' via its YouTube channel, www.youtube.com/@SDNPACommittees The public and parish councils are able to speak at its meetings, in line with the 'public participation' protocols detailed on its website.

Almost a hundred people, mainly residents along with representatives of The Woodcote team, attended Graffham Parish Council's planning committee at its meeting at the Empire Hall on Wednesday 4 June. Because of time constraints, the number of speakers was limited. Ten spoke against the proposal, and two of the developer's team members in favour. The parish councillors agreed unanimously that, while the proposal would deliver some benefits, these did not come near to outweighing the negatives. They felt it was not in line with many of the SDNPA's planning policies and breached a number of the National Planning Policy Framework requirements. Mirroring the submissions made by members of the

Hedge trim ruffles feathers

One of the exchanges to set the Graffham Parish Council planning meeting aflutter came when Colin Barker, the councillor leading on environmental issues, pointed out that he had written to The Woodcote team a year ago, after they had cut the hedges around their fields during the bird nesting season, pointing out that this was contrary to all advice and potentially in contravention of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. He said he received a polite response assuring that this would not be repeated – yet it was, just a week before last month's Empire Hall meeting.

Jim Dover, Director of Estates for Ledmore Estate, The Woodcote's owner, replied that it was more of a tidying up trim rather than a cut and his understanding was that this was permitted.

The RSPB encourages landowners, particularly in rural areas, to leave hedges untouched during the nesting season, to provide the sort of habitats in which wild birds thrive. Its website notes: "March to September marks the main nesting season, so it's crucial we don't disturb birds during this time. All birds, their nests and eggs are protected by law – the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981. This makes it illegal, with certain exceptions, to deliberately take, damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird while it is in use or being built. So, we recommend only cutting between 1 September and 28 February."

It adds, however, that you may legally cut vegetation year-round, as long as no active nests are moved or damaged, and recommends that, if a hedge has to be trimmed during the summer, a careful check is made first that no birds are nesting there and then using manual rather than power tools.

CPRE and Friends of South Downs object to proposal Among the more than 100 objections to The Woodcote proposal filed with the South Downs National Park Authority are submissions from CPRE The Countryside Charity, once more widely known as the Council for the Protection of Rural England, and the Friends of the South Downs, the only membership organisation dedicated to the conservation and enhancement of the region.

They state that the proposal would break several SDNPA policies and be contrary to several key elements of the National Policy Planning Framework. CPRE says: "The proposal, due to its size, location, scale of change of the development and change in the setting would have a significant effect. The proposed landscape and design is of a high quality but is entirely in the wrong place and not suitable for the proposed location."

Nonnington Hall renovations given go ahead

Plans for renovations and extensions to Nonnington Hall, one of Graffham's biggest houses, have been approved by the South Downs National Park Authority.

In a ruling made on 28 May, it gave the go-ahead for a two-storey extension on the north side to be replaced along with the construction of a new single-story extension on the south and another to the side with some reconfiguration of the interior. Externally, rendering can be replaced or added over the elevations, new windows fitted and current ones replaced and new dormers added on its southern side.

Nonnington Hall was bought in 2021 by Emma Wallace, who has since brought the farm there back to life. When she applied for planning permission last autumn she said: "It's been decades since Nonnington Hall benefitted from serious attention. It's got cracked windows and is drafty and damp. All in all, it's in much need of some tender loving care, which is what I want to give it, while respecting the wonderful building's history."

Infant school to get £300,000 cosy new roof

Graffham Infant School is to have a cosy new roof – costing some £300,000. The project has already been approved by the education teams at the Diocese of Chichester and West Sussex County Council – with funding allocated – and now just needs final sign-off by South Downs National Park Authority planners. The

aim is to carry out the work during the coming summer holidays and finish it off in the long vacation a year later, to minimise disruption to the school and for the health and safety of its children.

The current roof has been leaking for a while, causing concern that the lath-and-plaster ceilings inside the building might collapse. Some of the tiles have slipped down the steep roof after the original timber pegs holding them in place failed.

Also, because it was originally built in Victorian time, it has no insulation at all, making it expensive and inefficient to heat. Adding to the challenges, the school occupies one of only two buildings within the diocese education portfolio that is Grade II listed and is in a conservation area, so any renovations have to be carried out particularly sensitively.

The plan is to replace the pitched roof covering the original school building, using handmade tiles fixed using aluminium pegs, while introducing ventilation to

the roof spaces and upgrading the insulation. Roof timbers will be replaced or reinforced if necessary. Lead flashing in valleys and around chimneys will be renewed and skylights replaced. Inside, lath-and-plaster ceiling finishes, where they have been subject to damp and disturbance, will also be renewed. All will be done on a like-for-like basis, in sympathy with the special building that it is.

Three bat surveys have been conducted at twilight to ensure the works are not likely to disturb wildlife and the roof closely examined by a drone – which made the day for the pupils who were at school at the time.

It will be the third public building in the village to have roof works in the past year after steeplejacks made repairs to the top of St Giles Church last autumn and tilers carried out maintenance work on the Empire Hall in the winter.

£1,500 to be spent on repairing Rec access road

Graffham Parish Council is donating some £1,500 to the village's Recreation Ground to spend on repairs to its access road at the junction to the lane from the War Memorial where drainage works have recently been carried out.

Trust fund makes £2,500 one-off donation to school

The Katherine Maud Guillod Fund, a charitable trust set up a century ago for the benefit of the local area and administered by Graffham Parish Council, is to make a one-off donation of £2,500 to Graffham Infant School, to provide special support to pupils and their families. Under the terms of the trust, half of its annual income is given to Graffham Village Health Association, a quarter to the Thursday Club and the rest distributed at the parish council's discretion for charitable grants to persons or institutions connected with the village, principally preserving and maintaining footpaths and assisting pupils at the school.

Auditors have given Graffham Parish Council a clean bill of health for its accounts for the past financial year.

New line-up to keep Empire Hall's doors open

A flurry of hands has been raised to serve on the Empire Hall committee of management trustees since out-going Chairman and Bookings Secretary Sally Blunt warned a month ago that the village's 'grand old lady' might be forced to close without new blood.

She announced last autumn that she will be stepping down from her roles from

September, after almost 12 years' service in total. In an update to the annual meeting of the parish in late May (see June's *Graffham Parish News*) she advised that Anna Shawcross, who uses the building to provide her osteopathy services, would succeed her in the Booking Secretary position – but nobody had stepped forward to fill the post of Chairman.

Since then, however, there have been lots of offers of help. The trustees have named Ollie

Rec team re-elected after year of progress

Graffham Recreation Ground held its AGM at the Pavilion on Thursday 5 June, with all three key officers re-elected – Chairman John Bracey, Treasurer Bernard Bayly and Secretary David Sparkes who was also named to the new position of Deputy Chairman.

In his Chairman's statement, John Bracey reported on a year of sound progress, with the opening of the first phase of the new play park a high point. He paid tribute to Rachel Gerrett for leading this project. Fund raising to complete its final phase is now more than half way "so we hope to complete it during this year".

Other key achievements included the purchase of a new Solis tractor and associated equipment cutting the grass, along with reconditioning the old small John Deere lawn tractor and acquisition of new strimmer.

A new large flatscreen television has been installed in the Pavilion for watching sport and other programmes. It has also been fitted with

CCTV and exterior security lighting – with a defibrillator mounted on its exterior wall. Equipment for events has also been improved, with the addition of a dozen 6ft trestle tables and 60 rigid plastic chairs.

Lavington Estate to tackle spruce pest in woods

Lavington Stud and Estate is to fell some Norway Spruce on its land in the coming weeks to prevent the spread of a serious pest affecting the trees that has only recently been identified in the UK.

South Downs Countryside Manager Nick Heasman said: "The eight-toothed bark beetle *Ips typographus* has hit spruces in continental Europe for years, but was only found in Britain in 2018, in Kent. It prefers stressed or dying trees but, under the right conditions, it can attack healthy specimens and has the potential to cause significant damage to our nation's forestry and timber industries. Sadly, it has been found in Graffham recently."

In line with action by the Forestry Commission to manage outbreaks of the pest, a pre-emptive felling of a small plantation of Norway Spruce will be carried out on the estate later this summer.

It will form part of the wider restoration of its ancient woodland, designed to reestablish native broadleaved trees and the species that thrive in this special habitat. The restocking of these native trees will begin in late autumn.

The work, which has been approved by the Forestry Commission, will be done by English Woodlands, as agents for Lavington Stud and Estate, which covers 650 acres across Graffham and East Lavington, including meadowland and, on the slope of Graffham Down, woodland.

Graffham Village Shop Association (GVSA) holds its annual general meeting on Thursday 17 July at 7pm in the Pavilion at the Rec. The agenda and other papers for the meeting will be circulated to shareholder members ahead of then.

The GVSA owns the premises operated by Jeeva and Vasu, the unit alongside currently used by picture framer Stephanie Marx and the Chapel View residential house and is responsible for the overall maintenance of the properties, for collecting rents owed by the lessees, enabling it to repay the bank loan which financed the redevelopment of buildings in 2015. It also considers improvements which will benefit the community as a whole and for safeguarding these vital village assets for the long-term future.

Roads to the west and north of Graffham will be closed for much of early July for long-awaited repairs to potholes and bumps, worsened when the lanes were used as cut-throughs while Midhurst's North Street was closed two years ago following the fire at the Angel Inn

West Sussex County Council has arranged for the lane between the village and the A286 at Cocking Causeway is to be resurfaced from Wednesday 2 to Tuesday 8 July with lining to follow the following week between 9 and 13 July. The work will be carried out between Graffham's Perrott Lane, right along Polecats and Bex Lane, to the A286's Heyshott turning – with the road closed for much of this time.

Selham Road is also listed for closure from 2 to 8 July for resurfacing, from the Graffham Common Road right up to its junction with the A272 at Halfway Bridge.

Graffham's annual meeting of the parish

The timing of Graffham's annual meeting of the parish, in the Empire Hall on 21 May, meant that we were unable to cover it fully in last month's edition, so we catch up here.

'Always plenty of issues to tackle here' - Chairman

Here's an abridged version of Graffham Parish Council Chairman Gillian Charlesworth's annual report to the village.

This may be a small village – but there are always plenty of issues for Graffham Parish Council to tackle. In the past year, we have looked at speed limits in the village, footpath and road maintenance, environmental issues, the possibility of merger with East Lavington Parish Council, maintenance of St Giles' closed church yard and additional car access through Seaford College's West Gate.

We have also had a change of chairmanship, and I would like to thank Roger Coakes for leading the council as chairman until January this year. I also warmly thank our clerk Caroline Davison and my fellow Councillors for their support and hard work on behalf of the whole village.

Rachel Gerrett has achieved great progress on the children's play park through extraordinary hard work and determination to raise the necessary funds. Fiona Jacob has led us in our consideration of planning applications, an aspect of our work that is set to become ever busier over the next few months with some major developments to consider. Colin Barker has been relentless in his pursuit of environmental issues and maintenance of our wonderful network of footpaths. As Deputy Chair, John Bracey is a huge support and has led on a wide range of actions including the Recreation Ground, which he chairs. He also managed the installation of our new defibrillators at the school and the Recreation and in the old phone box at Pescods. This means that we now have five defibrillators in the village.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank the many volunteers who make Graffham the vibrant and welcoming village it is. Besides those delivering their reports 'live' at the annual parish meeting, they include:

- Carole Kirke and the Graffham Garden Group who raise funds and spend time enhancing the village with planting and maintenance in various spots, including the war memorial.
- Volunteers at the Rec who mow the field and playground and help to maintain the Pavilion.



- Jim Kirke and the Graffham Down Trust who maintain an area of Downs for us to enjoy.
- The Thursday Club led by Diane Bellis and the Lunch Club hosted by Sarah Lydiard Wilson and Jill McLean which give so much pleasure to their members every month.
- Phil Jones and his team who gave us such a fun and memorable Graffham Festival.

Now turning to parish council activities over the year. Funding village needs is one of our most important roles. The parish council provides an annual grant of just over £2,500 to the Rec, of which the council is a trustee. From Community Infrastructure Levy funding, we allocated £20,000 to the new children's play park and funded the new defibrillators.

We also administer the Katherine Maud Guillod Fund, a charitable fund set up nearly a hundred years ago, through which we have made regular payments to the Graffham Village Health Association and the Thursday Club. Through this fund, we have also helped with footpath repairs and are currently considering an allocation of funding for play therapy support for vulnerable children at Graffham and Duncton Schools.

We hope soon to receive a grant to enhance the War Memorial as part of VE and VJ Day commemorations and will also allocate village funds to this project. Communication from the Parish Council to residents of the village is critical. We

need to ensure that you are informed about our meetings, our activities and our decisions. At our last meeting we agreed to start development of a new parish council website which should be ready in a couple of months.

During this year, we conducted a survey on road speeds which showed wide support for a 20mph speed limit. We are now working with our county councillor, Tom Richardson, the village school and other local parishes to bring about this change.

We have proposed a merger with East Lavington Council, with the aim of doing more together to enhance our villages through pooling resources. This has yet to be decided.

This forms part of a village plan that Graffham Parish Council is proposing, to enable our community to prepare ahead and ensure it and its assets are well maintained on a long-term basis, enabling the council to prioritise on issues that the residents agree are important and ensure the community remains well managed and vibrant well into the future. We will be seeking your feedback and input on this in the months ahead.

Caring for our environment and rights of way

Colin Barker summarises his activities as Graffham Parish Council's lead councillor for environmental issues and rights of way.

Environment Letters have been sent to the South Downs National Park Authority and the Environment Agency bringing to their attention Graffham Parish Council's concern with regard to the disused oil well at Baxter's Copse, on the west side of the parish near Hoyle. We are concerned that after so many years of it not being in use, the well's concrete cap could potentially be leaking methane. We have asked for this to be checked without delay. The oil well at Singleton has recently been sold by Igas to Star Energy. It now no longer produces oil, only gas, which indicates it is coming towards the end of its productivity. So we should ensure that the Baxter's Copse facility remains in good condition before Star Energy leaves this part of the world.

Weed killers and slug pellets I am concerned over the impact on our local environment of the continued reliance on weed killers and slug pellets by villagers. Surely everyone must be aware of the damage these cause to both insects and wildlife? I'm so pleased to witness wildlife gradually becoming more abundant

here in Grafham, with more owls, slow worms, always lots of bats in the evening and even a large adult hedgehog showing up in our garden – the first in more than 20 years! Plus of course the welcome return of the house martins at Calloways this spring, an indication of the greater insect life in the vicinity and environmental improvements being made within the village.

Footpaths and byways The storms earlier in the year meant that our footpaths and byways required greater clearing than just regular annual maintenance, especially along the slopes of the South Downs. This involves quite a lot of detective work to find out who owns what, but most are now open again following a few prompts – so many thanks to all those responsible. Unfortunately, the condition of some in the village still leaves a lot to be desired with a few still remaining impassable.

Hedges and verges The maintenance of the village's hedges and verges involves me contacting parishioners with usually a polite request for them to trim back overgrowth that is becoming a danger to road users. Mostly these requests have been acted upon and roadside hedges and verges here are generally in a good state.

Ditches Some of the larger land owners have been carrying out some really good work maintaining ditches recently. Some of these ditches have not been taken care of properly for many years, and with the weather pattern being as it is now, having a properly working ditch is a vital part of any land management.



Bill's bygones: Brett, Bex Mill, Burton Park

A regular feature in which joint editor Bill Barrett looks back at what was happening in the village and the wider world this month in the past.

10 years ago – July 2015: Graffham Tennis Club's ninth Tennis Week gets underway. Brett Creed and Geoff Coulson hold their Fabulous Music Quiz at the Pavilion, then double-handedly hammer Kirdford in a Twenty20 cricket midweek match at the Rec, with Brett "walloping" an undefeated 69, and Geoff taking a hat trick. The highest temperature for 12 years, and the hottest July day yet in the UK, is recorded at Heathrow (36.7°C, 98.1°F). Tim Farron is elected leader of the Liberal Democrats. Lewis Hamilton wins the British Grand Prix and Chris Froome the Tour de France. England's footballers finish third in the Women's World Cup. Deaths of humanitarian Sir Nicholas Winton (aged 106, and the subject of the film *One Life*, recently screened by Graffham Empire Movies), BBC racing commentator Sir Peter O'Sullevan (97), Irish crooner/TV presenter Val Doonican (88) and actor Omar Sharif (83).

25 years ago – July 2000: This month's meeting of Graffham Parish Council is the first for new clerk Richard Buckler, who replaces Elli Spilberg. Chairman Diana Kingsmill reports that Long Bostle has been changed to a "byway open to all traffic", contrary to the wishes of the council, while the traffic priority at Bex Mill bridge is also discussed. Graffham Cricket Club on tour defeat Chipping Norton and Stanton but lose to South Chelmsford. The body of eight-year-old Sarah Payne is found near Pulborough. Alex Salmond resigns as leader of the Scottish National Party. Reality TV show *Big Brother* airs for the first time in the UK. An Air France Concorde crashes shortly after take-off from Paris' Charles de Gaulle airport, killing 100 on board and four on the ground. Deaths of retired Archbishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie (78) and actor Walter Matthau (79).

50 years ago – July 1975: A dilemma for the judges at Graffham Garden Group's 11th summer show when the rule that nobody can win the Ricardo Cup for best dahlias more than two years in succession means that John Holland is awarded the trophy despite the blooms of Mrs Claydon (winner in 1973 and 1974) being judged the best. Graffham Downlands School applies for planning permission to extend its existing hutted classrooms. Lodsworth Church Fête is opened by David Dimbleby. A serious heath fire at Burton Park follows weeks of dry weather. Prince Charles plays polo at Cowdray for the first time since 1972, accompanied by his "attractive, raven-haired" second cousin, and ex-girlfriend of actor Richard Burton, Princess Elizabeth of Yugoslavia. ITV airs the first series of *Celebrity Squares* hosted by Bob Monkhouse. Death of actor James Robertson Justice (Sir Lancelot Spratt in the *Doctor* films, 68).

Graffham Chronicles: Halsey Ricardo 1854-1928

In her column this month, local historian Pauline Goodwin focusses on the patriarch of one of Graffham's most noted families, the Ricardos, following publication of a book about his contribution to the Arts and Crafts movement.

I make no apologies for returning this month to the Ricardo dynasty, a lineage whose activities and influence is evident today in Graffham but reaches back to the 1880s with Halsey Ricardo, the family patriarch. He was the one who established the Ricardo home in the village – and some of his descendants still live here today.

Three years before her death in 2021, Halsey's granddaughter Camilla Bosanquet identified 14 members of the family buried in St Giles' churchyard. Among them were architects, experts on African fish, artists, suffragettes and world leading internal combustion engineers. So Halsey was the founder of a family of extraordinary talents in such varied fields. Today, Halsey's great grandson Mark Bertram reminds us that at least one of his relatives still lives in Graffham.

Conquered by Graffham's beauty he built not just his own family home here but also brought his Arts and Crafts magic to several other properties locally too.

In 1885, Halsey purchased a few acres of "pine bowered beauty" here, planting a cedar there to mark the birth of his son Harry. That tree is still standing.

His first design for this site was given the name Ravenshurst but this was never built. It was replaced by a plan for the family house originally called Woodside, but changed in 1979 by another of Halsey's granddaughters, Kate Bertram, and her husband Colin who were intent on perpetuating the family name. So it is now called

Ricardo's. Kate was that expert on East African fish, incidentally. She was also President of Lucy Cavendish College, Cambridge, though lived in Graffham at Woodside. In the two decades after buying

In the two decades after buying the plot, Halsey landscaped the garden with three brick wall terraces, created an orchard and a paddock. Woodside was eventually built on the site in 1905 and a lodge added four years later.

Great grandson Mark Bertram recalls with pleasure his days spent at Woodside visiting his family. He recalls the resident staff retained by grandfather his and grandmother, Harry and Beatrice Ricardo - Mr and Mrs Bicknell who lived in the cottage at the bottom of the drive, and Evelyn (Brown), who

gradually took over from Mrs Bicknell in the house and also moved into the lodge. He also remembers with fondness 16-year-old June Challen née Ford "who came to Woodside daily to keep us occupied, active and fed".

Halsey's quest for beauty was achieved sympathetically at Woodside, according to the elegant writing of Sir Lawrence Weaver, in a seven-page feature in *Country Life* on 30 October 1909, and in the book *Small Country Houses of Today*. Weaver wrote that during this landscaping process "happily few trees needed to be felled". He added: "The sober beauties of this Sussex home and its setting become impressive even to a casual visitor... Mr Ricardo has not dragooned nature but has slowly tempered her disorder."

Halsey also left his touch on other properties locally. He designed elements of Grove Cottage on Popple Hill, which dates back to the 16th century. Mark Bertram recently visited this building, now home to Phil and Susie Jones, and was particularly impressed by the central chimney which is fed by four separate fireplaces. Halsey's designs were most creative in terms of decoration for fire surrounds, but also his knowledge of the science involved allowed him to build in efficiency by recycling heat within the walls and upper floors, as at Woodside. He also added a separate wing and studio to Carpenters Town in 1923 for his daughter Anna and her husband, Maresco Pearce.

Anna's son John Ricardo Pearce contributed to a survey of Graffham houses

conducted by the Rev David Grant four or so decades ago, noting that a cottage on Brook Street, Carpenters Town "was built by Halsey Ricardo as a stable". This building has been referred to as Snooke's Barn. I remember the Snookes on Brook Street, and Eleanor and Almer Snooke are laid to rest in St Giles' churchyard.

Halsey's life was packed with jaw-dropping accomplishments far and wide, as an architect and designer.

decorate his ware. In 1882, Halsey developed a new green coloured glaze which he called peach green. This proved successful and was copied by Wedgwood as a new colourway for its Jasperware, to which they gave the name Dysart green – from the Earl of Dysart's seat for which Halsey designed a mantelpiece.

He took part in five London exhibitions of the Arts and Crafts – in 1888, 1893, 1896 1903 and 1910. As part of this, he wrote an article on furniture for an 1893 anthology, edited by William Morris, *Arts and Crafts Essays: Arts and Crafts Exhibition Society* which can still be bought today.

In their Sand's End Pottery in London, Halsey and William de Morgan collaborated to produce ceramics and tiles to be used in an innovative architectural way. Halsey was keen to use a glaze that, when used on exterior walls, would resist the polluted atmosphere of 19th Century London. A project to benefit from this type of exterior tiling was one of his best-known designs — the gateway to Calcutta, the city's



Howrah Station. Twelve 12 P&O liners also took these designs around the world. His most famous work using these exterior glazed tiles was Debenham House in London's Holland Park, designed in 1905 for the head of the department store. Its outside was completely faced with waterproof glazed bricks and tiles, including the roof. His granddaughter Camilla Bosanquet says it paid for Halsey to build Woodside.

Halsey's understanding of beauty alongside sympathetic and flawless design was the hallmark of everything he designed – buildings, furniture, artefacts and tile – remarkable artistry charted by great grandson Mark Bertram, also an architect, in a book *Halsey Ricardo, A Life in Arts and Craft*, published this spring, in which he described his forebear as being "deservedly recognised as a champion of the Arts and Crafts movement".

Halsey Ricardo died on 15 February 1928, aged 73, in Graffham. Marked by a plain stone, he was interred in St Giles' churchyard, in the village where he chose to lay his head and make his family home.

Nature Notes: Catch a cricket before they're all out

A regular column by Sussex naturalist and wildlife guide Michael Blencowe, who can regularly be spotted in and around Graffham.

I'm a huge fan of trashy sci-fi B-movies and they don't come any better (or worse) than 1957's *Beginning of the End*. It's the usual story – over-eager government scientists intent on increasing crop yields inadvertently create giant irradiated grasshoppers the size of doubler-decker buses which set about destroying Chicago. There are some similar creatures lurking around Sussex. Admittedly, they're not big enough to start stomping on Selham any day soon but they're still mighty impressive.

The great green bush cricket can claim to be Britain's biggest insect. Yet this Godzilla of the undergrowth is surprisingly hard to see. Its long leaf-like body blends in amongst the brambles rendering it almost invisible. Bug eyes, impressive jaws and twirling antennae give it some monster movie credentials, but there's nothing to fear from this harmless native.

There are about 35 species of crickets and grasshoppers (*Orthoptera*) in Britain. Crickets differ from grasshoppers by having much longer, thread-like antennae and they 'sing' by rubbing their wings together (while grasshoppers rub their legs



against their wings). This song or stridulation is the male's way of romancing a female – who, if interested, will reply.

The best chance of finding the great green bush cricket is to head out on a warm late summer evening and listen for their downland duets. They make a loud, incessant rattle – imagine a maraca player after drinking too much coffee.

I was leading a wildlife walk through the flower-rich meadows of the South Downs recently and was blown away by the wall of sound created by hundreds of crickets and grasshoppers. But it became apparent that not everyone could hear this orthopteran orchestra. The sad truth is that as we get older our ears can't tune in to the higher frequencies produced by these insects and, species by species, they fall silent to us.

I have a compilation CD of the chirps and buzzes of Britain's crickets and grasshoppers – a sort of *Now That's What I Call Stridulation*. I played it this morning and track 24 had gone. It was there a few years ago but now... silence. I've started to lose my crickets! The beginning of the end.

It isn't just me who will be hearing less wildlife in the future. Our countryside is becoming quieter as crickets, bees and birds vanish. Over the decades, changes in agricultural practices have made large parts of England quieter. The *Silent Spring* predicted by Rachel Carson in 1962 has seeped across every season.

Out and about: A call to disturb cocoa time

An occasional column by Jonathan Simons, amateur botanist and font of useless knowledge on so many things obscure and bizarre.

Nightjars arrive hereabouts from Africa in May, hatch two broods and then return to the Dark Continent in September. They are nocturnal, hunting for insects at night, remaining camouflaged on the heathland ground during the day. Their distinctive churr we hear is the male call and is supplemented by wing-clapping in

flight with the aim to attract the female. When we moved to Graffham many moons ago, we used to go out to watch and listen for on Lavington and Heyshott nightjars The churring occurs just at Common. from about 9.30 twilight, to Unfortunately, that coincides with cocoa time, and it is often difficult to rouse oneself to leave the house. Whether they call around dawn as well I have never had the singleness

of mind to discover. My photographs of adult birds are not very impressive. On Heyshott Common I thought I got video of nightjars flying against the darkening sky and clapping their wings. It turned out though that the noise was a faulty camera lens clicking in and out. It was not until after the Sussex Wildlife Trust took over Graffham Common in 2009 and opened it up that the nightjars moved in closer to home. Standing at the top of Gallows Hill, you get the best chance of a rewarding encounter. However, one night we just opened the kitchen window and listened to this moving chorus without having to dress at all for the occasion.

In June 2012, I was looking for snakes on Heyshott Common when an apparently injured bird flapped ahead of me into the bushes. I thought it might be damaged and that I could somehow help it out but it flapped off further. I happened to glance down to check my footing and I saw two fluffy balls and some broken eggshells. Yes, they were

nightjar chicks and the mother was luring me away. I felt so guilty about disturbing them. It certainly shows why we should always keep dogs under close control on the commons and not let them blunder around damaging the habitat and scaring off our precious wildlife.




