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Writing from the Rectory: Holding the Church together

In January 2023, ahead of the General Synod meeting in February, the Church of England bishops proposed the Church offer prayers of blessing for same sex couples following civil marriage, though not marriage in church itself.

For some, it's a step which goes in the right direction albeit not far enough, while for others it's the wrong direction. The bishops' hope was to hold the church

together in England, and across the worldwide Anglican Communion It remains to be seen how well this can be achieved.

Following this announcement, conversation at the Rectory over breakfast, prompted by a Daily Telegraph article which declared it was an irony therefore cheek (tongue in



maybe) that the church is held together by its gay clergy. My view was that it's unsurprising, really, for there to be such clergy in the CofE, despite its position on same sex relationships, because the church naturally draws in people who've had some kind of hard time in life. That includes anyone who feels alienated Continued on next page



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or isolated by society, or who has been burdened by guilt, or beset by anxieties or sickness or grief, or prejudice, or has travelled through any kind of trouble.

The words of the beatitudes speak most eloquently to those who identify personally with them and are thus most openly aware of their need of Christ's blessing and its availability to us:

'Blessed are the poor in spirit...blessed are those who mourn...blessed are the meek...blessed are those who hunger and thirst after righteousness...blessed are the merciful...blessed are the pure in heart...blessed are the peacemakers...blessed are those who suffer persecution for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.' (See Matthew 5.1-12 for full text.)

All people should find this blessing in church, as a place of unconditional welcome, refuge, solace, forgiveness, liberation and acceptance.

And at best they can, though they may also find a church wrestling with some of the issues which cause them pain in the first place and continue to do so, making offering any ministry deeply sacrificial.

The Church is a work in progress – as are we all – and sometimes painfully slow to adjust to a new appreciation of what love really means. I suggest those who continue in ministry despite this, for the sake of the church as it can be, are redemptive of the Church, are a true measure of its love, and the very best reason for holding the Church together – not ironically, but in sincerity.

Mothering Sunday Everyone needs a bit of mothering every now and again – and can offer it too! Do come with all your family to our special Mothering Sunday service at St Giles on Sunday 19 March at 10.30am – complete with Graffham's traditional posies of flowers for Mums and everyone else!

Easter Holy Week falls early in April this year, so details of our Easter services are included in this edition of our parish magazine to enable you to plan ahead. The Easter egg hunt around St Giles' churchyard is always a highlight of this time of year for young and old alike – chocoholics of all ages welcome! (See page 40)

New rules for Graffham Village Shop Association

An update from Graffham Village Shop Association Chairman Steve Dover

One of the areas the Graffham Village Shop Association (GVSA) committee has been looking at recently is the requirement to update the rules under which the GVSA operates. The current rules were drawn up on the GVSA's incorporation in 1994 under the Industrial and Provident Societies Acts, With only minor amendments since then, they are now out of date with both current law and practice.

The Industrial and Provident Societies Acts were replaced by the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act in 2014 and the regulatory framework under which the GVSA operates was changed.

So the GVSA committee intends to use, as a precedent, a set of model rules developed by the Plunkett Foundation (which supports many community shops and other enterprises) for community benefit societies, such as ourselves, and which have been pre-approved by the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA).

This will simplify the whole process, reduce the work associated with this update and make it easier to get FCA approval when we register our new rules with them.

Once we have a draft set of new rules we will communicate further with GVSA members and explain the differences between the current set of rules and the new ones so as to allow any questions to be answered. We would like to finish this process in good time so we can have the new set of rules approved at the association's AGM in June for submission to the FCA for approval and registration.

The Empire strikes back

Like many a venerable lady of a certain age, Graffham's Empire Hall is undergoing something of a gentle metamorphosis with new faces on its management committee – including a new chairman after a gap of several years – and activities back to prelockdown levels, including its first full-scale Easter Market in a few weeks' time (see pages 11-13).

Just like in the good old days, there's something or another going on there every weekday, with most weekends featuring a broad range of events, some open to all, some private bookings.

The grand old lady of Graffham, as some people refer to it, has stood at the very centre of village life since it was bequeathed to the community upon its opening by benefactor James Buchanan, later Lord Woolavington, in 1907 (see page 14). There's hardly a national or local landmark that has not been commemorated there – through wars to peacetime, from christening parties through wedding receptions to funeral wakes. Between times, it has been used to host sports sessions, dances, concerts, plays, cinema and flower shows, council meetings, medical treatments, lunches, dinners, fund-raisers, medal presentations, elections, you name it...

Its management committee of trustees, a mix of volunteers and representatives drawn from its most frequent users, is determined it stays at the centre of village life for this and future generations.

It is now led by Sally Blunt, filling the role of Chairperson that has been vacant since Jim Kirke stepped down from the role after several years' service which saw the completion of an extensive upgrade to the hall's facilities, supported by grants from the Lottery Fund and European Union, among others.

This included installing a brand new kitchen, up-grading its toilet facilities, with, for the first time, an accessible loo for the disabled, replacing the dilapidated sheds at the back with a barn-style storage building, tidying up the garden and giving the whole place a much-needed lick of paint.

Sally served as Bookings Secretary under Jim's leadership for three years before handing over to Eira Ashby and took up the reins again in September. Sally is combining the Chairmanship with the Bookings Secretary position until a new person can take over the bookings role.

Also combining roles until additional volunteers step forward is village newcomer Gillian Charlesworth as Secretary and Maintenance Officer – everything from

ensuring the building's safe, sound and secure to keeping its oil and gas topped up. The third officer is long-serving and highly valued Treasurer Carole Sargent.

Making up the management committee are:

- Sarah Lydiard-Wilson, representing Graffham Health Support Association.
- Jill McLean, representing the monthly Lunch Club.
- Diane Bellis, representing the Thursday Club.
- Patrick Churchward, representing Graffham Parish Council.

The hall's busy weekly calendar of events incudes osteopathy treatment and fitness activities, yoga and pilates classes, badminton and its popular "ease into exercise" sessions. Plus, of course, the twice-weekly visits from the roving Post Office. (For its full regular schedule, see page 45.) In the past year alone, thanks to the Trojan efforts of Jim Kirke, it has also opened its doors to Chic and Fleetwood Mac tribute

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bands and touring theatre companies, while Sally has organised concerts by a James Taylor celebration group and the Chaps Choir. It has hosted too the village's annual Burns Night Celebration, Graffham Garden Group events, the monthly lunches and Thursday Club gatherings, Graffham Parish Council meetings...

It is proving increasingly popular too for private events – children's birthday parties, special wedding anniversaries and so on. It has bookings for a family 100th birthday party for a much-loved local lady, gardeners' training courses and more.

They are all much needed to keep a roof over the head of this historic building. Sally said: "It's a pleasure to be back on this friendly, supportive and fun committee. Ever since I first drove past the Empire Hall on our first ever visit to Graffham a decade ago, I have felt a strong affection for this characterful hall. It

has such a very special atmosphere, lending itself to such a variety of activities and moods. It's as if the love and laughter through the years of all the people who have ever lived here in this village and beyond has soaked into its walls.

"If you want to join us taking care of the Old Lady, in whichever way you see fit – on the committee or as a helper at events – do please get in touch with me or one of the committee members. Or just come and attend the events which are put on. It's much more fun to be in than out !"

Graffham Chronicles: Village's 'grand old lady'

In her regular column, village historian Pauline Goodwin this month looks back at the life and times of the Empire Hall.

The Empire Hall, the grand old lady of Graffham, is now in its 116th year – and looking better than it has for years, set in well-groomed surroundings, with the magnificent, juvenile copper beech standing over it. The hall sits comfortably within our village with a design that seems to have many nods to its founder, James Buchanan, owner at the time of the Lavington Stud.

The style of roof is key here and is known by a variety of names – gambrel, mansard, hipped or Dutch. This style of roof originated in North America among the indigenous tribes of the Pacific Northwest and then spread across the northern reaches of the continent. Gambrel, by the way, according to The Dictionary of Americanism, is "so called from the resemblance to the hind leg of a horse

which farriers term the gambrel" – so very fitting for a village with a strong relationship with the horse.

Mr Buchanan, who was knighted in 1920 before being elevated two years later to become Lord Woolavington, also began his life in the same continent, in Brockville, Ontario, Canada. His parents were Scottish immigrants who moved to Larne, Northern Ireland, shortly after his birth in 1849. His father was employed as a quarry manager there. So both the building and benefactor had humble origins.

He bought the Lavington Estate – which back then included what are today the buildings and grounds of Seaford College, Lavington and Westerlands

Studs, Haylands Farm and much of the villages of East Lavington and Graffham – in 1903 after amassing a fortune in the whisky trade. By the time of the Empire Hall's opening, his Black and White blended Scotch was the best-selling brand in England. At the stud, he bred winners of the Epsom Derby and St Leger's.

He was a generous benefactor to the village – with the Empire Hall just one of his local legacies. Its opening ceremony, in 1907, was a lavish affair. One of the chief speakers, also originating from Canada, was Andrew Bonar Law MP who later

became Prime Minister. He said of James Buchanan that "the hall was the crown of what he had done for Graffham". The *West Sussex Gazette* at the time quoted Mr Buchanan as saying that the hall was "strictly a sample of home enterprise... built and fitted entirely by the employees on the estate and the men of the district working under agent Mr Hales". The 'men of the district' would have included Mr Pinker who also built Fairacre, Thereaway and Chart Cottage.

A document in the Graffham Archive records that the hall's building materials were also literally home grown, as the roof timbers were cut from the wood behind Carpenters Town – although the greenness of these timbers actually caused structural problems in later years.

No record was made of the hall's architect but the modest and unpretentious design has a strong likeness to two of the barns at the stud. The design followed Buchanan's requirement that the hall should have a high capacity of 400 villagers. The gambrel roof – with its hipped design providing extra headroom – increased capacity, housing 75 on the balcony.

Of the building's interior, Mr Buchanan told The West Sussex Gazette: "They have

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certainly much to be proud of in the building they have put up, which includes the library and reading room, on either side of the entrance and a capitally arranged kitchen". The kitchen featured a coke stove for heating, a "copper" in the corner

with a chamber underneath for lighting a fire to heat the water and the WI's machine for canning fruit.

The Weller family raised the money to "go on the electric" in this period, marking the end of the copper and lights with their fragile Welsbach mantels. The committee rooms had various functions, as medical consulting facilities.

Graffham has a long history of reading rooms and in 1890 such a provision was marked on a map at The Pines. With the opening of the Empire Hall, the Graffham and East Lavington Free Library was housed in its Kennedy Room. Used now as the

bar, this room is named after Colonel Sydney Kennedy of South Ambersham, who was a manager of Lavington Stud and second chairman of the Hall Committee, succeeding General Turner, also a manager of the stud, who lived at the Malt House. The library was stocked with a rich variety of books and was still active when I was a teenager although then some books were supplied on a rotational basis by the West Sussex County Council Library Service. The library, in the 1960s, was run by several villagers, including Kate Drawbridge who with her husband Commander "Tat" Drawbridge built and lived at Willows Lee. These volunteers would run the library and order specific books from the county library, a service which I was very fortunate to use in the 1960s to access texts for A Levels.

Previous hall caretakers are remembered. George Howick is noted for his magic lantern shows, a less technical forerunner of the more recent Graffham Empire Movies. He was followed by Mrs Weller, Mrs McKenzie, Mrs Ned Challen, Mrs Hughes, Mrs Olive Challen, Mrs Earle, Mrs Robinson and Mrs Wakeford. According to the Graffham Archive, pay was "4d an hour and 25/6d for closing up after functions ending after 10pm" – equivalent to less than 2p and £1.27 in today's money.

The hall was called into service during the two World Wars. In 1914 recruitment was held there for the Territorial Army. It also served as base for the village's Air Raid Precautions team, the Home Guard and evacuation authorities, culminating

in September 1939 with the arrival of three parties of evacuees, to be homed locally, away from the heaviest bombing.

In peace time, the hall served the village well with events such as boxing tournaments, run by Ben Wareham, and square dancing. One remarkable occasion that comes to mind was in the early 1960s when Lady McDonald Lord Buchanan. successor to Woolavington, held a tea party at the hall. This was for all of the numerous stud staff and their families, including me. Her ladyship circulated through the packed hall and spoke to every single person, including the Tomlinsons, the Claydons, the Strudwicks and Eric Miles.

In the 1950s and 60s Whist and Beetle Drives were popular. Whist Drives, organised by the football, bowls and stoolball clubs, attracted big crowds with "tables spread into all parts of the building". At one time "40 new packs of cards were ordered", again according to the archives.

More recent events include Christmas and Easter fairs, flower shows, public meetings, toddler sessions, playgroups, youth clubs and private functions, and sports activities such as badminton, keep fit, yoga, line dancing and ballet. At election times, it is our local polling station, and it is where Graffham

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Parish Council holds its meetings. Janet Wakeford recalls the Monday night table tennis sessions in the 1950s. For decades, the Brownies, Guides, Cubs and Scouts held meetings and their annual gang show there. Theatrical productions, including by the village am dram group the Rustics, were among the most hall's popular events – to be detailed in a future article...

Dances have been in demand during war and peace times. Many Canadians stationed in the area during World War II frequented dances in the hall and more recently there have been well attended events like Bob Crosdill's discos in the 1980s and 1990s, Don Allen's Valentine's Day dances, Sally Blunt's retro tea dances, Burns Night reeling and Jim Kirke's band nights, such as last month's Le Freak. Over the years, it has hosted countless wedding receptions, christening parties and funeral wakes, besides the Ameer of Bahawalpur's legendary Christmas parties for the children of the neighbourhood.

This is the Empire Hall – people of the village sharing experiences and finding joy in coming together! Let us remember the vision of its founder James Buchanan who said at its opening ceremony back in 1907: "This hall is to be the means of giving amusement, pleasure and improvement to the people living in the neighbourhood". Well over a century later, it is still going strong.

Briefing from the Belfry: A ring of 50

An occasional column from Graffham's team of bellringers

Many readers will know Vicky Chase. She lived in Graffham for around 15 years from 1976 – with its hot summer during which her mother fetched water from the standpipe! She learned to ring the church bells at our own St Giles a decade or so after that big heat, alongside many of the present village ringers – and has been instrumental in training, co-ordinating and motivating Graffham's bellringers in recent years with a team of instructors who make the journey to our Tuesday training sessions, even in the depths of winter.

In bell ringing circles, her official title is Training and Recruitment Team Leader for the Sussex County Association of Change Ringers (SCACR) and her

commitment to the activity will be even greater as she undertakes an ambitious challenge to celebrate her 50th birthday on the 27 April. Her plan is to ring bells in 50 Sussex bell towers in 50 days. To make it all a bit more complicated, those 50 days coincide with Holy Week, when there is no ringing. So she is having to double up on some towers to compensate. She'll kick off on Saturday 11 March – at St Giles – when she'll join the Graffham ringers for their regular practice session on the

second Saturday of the month. That will be followed by her home tower, Kirdford, on the same afternoon.

Thereafter she will tour the many towers of Sussex in a carefully planned journey over the subsequent weeks. In each location, she will slot into the regular practice sessions or Sunday ringing (bellringers are famously welcoming to visitors) and will be undoubtedly challenged by some of the 'methods' she will be expected to ring. St Nicholas is one of her favourite methods and she's hoping that at least one of the venues will have enough ringers to offer this for her.

She is also relishing ringing in some bigger towers. While St Giles has six bells, there are several towers in the county with eight bells, and she is looking forward to one of Brighton's with ten.

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Nature Notes: Something 'fishy' in your house

A monthly column by Sussex Wildlife Trust's Head of Community Action for Wildlife Michael Blencowe.

Last night I awoke from a nightmare with a beating heart and a dry mouth. Dragging on my dressing gown I stumbled into the kitchen and hit the light switch. There, stood in the middle of my kitchen, was a fantastical creature straight out of the dark, primordial corners of my imagination. Dazzled by the light, it recoiled and, like a droplet of quicksilver, flowed across the lino and under the fridge.

We humans allow many animals into our homes – dogs, cats, budgies, iguanas – but other animals live with us too, uninvited. Silverfish are nocturnal creatures of damp crevices. Those dark unacknowledged areas under our baths and sinks provide their perfect 'des res'.

They've netted the name 'fish' because of their shiny scales and wiggling movement but silverfish are actually primitive insects. They're quite unique. Their only close relative in Britain is the wonderfully named firebrat. (Unlike silverfish, firebrats love extreme heat and were once a familiar sight around the

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brickwork of fireplaces. Today firebrats flourish around furnaces and industrial catering ovens.).

For such primitive creatures, silverfish have a courtship ritual far more tender and romantic than some of my clumsy performances. Male and female face off



and tentatively touch their trembling antennae. If this first date goes well they'll progress to the next stage – a joyous chase before snuggling side-by-side.

They feed on anything containing starch or cellulose – spilt food, hair and flakes of human skin. When it comes to eating dandruff, they're head and shoulders above the rest. They've achieved notoriety by eating neglected books, nibbling on paper and the glue in bindings.

You may want to banish them from your home but silverfish are here to stay. The ones we see today are pretty much the same creature that existed in the Devonian period, around 400 million years ago. Their body structure and lifestyle are perfectly adapted for life on Earth and, hell, if it ain't broke don't fix it. Let's just pause a moment to consider that fact – silverfish have been silverfish for 400 million years.

In that time they've seen it all come and go. They were already ancient when T Rex came stomping 68 million years ago. They watched us whippersnappers climb out of the trees 2.8 million years ago, and they were still here when I looked under my fridge last night.

Silverfish were around when our planet was being built and they've hung around long enough to watch us humans dismantle it. And when our failing species make itself extinct, they'll just shrug their little silverfish shoulders and carry on. And all those pretty words we have written will be slowly eaten by the silverfish until the next bunch of chancers evolve and claim that they're the dominant species on this planet.

Meet your neighbour: St Giles Place's first residents

A regular feature in which we introduce local residents. This month, editor Michael Blunt catches up with Anthony and Fenella Forsyth, who became the first occupants of the new houses built around Graffham's Homes of Rest last autumn.

When Anthony and Fenella Forsyth first walked through the front door of 1 St Giles Place on their moving-in-day on 30 September last year – as the first occupants of any of the five new houses built around the Homes of Rest – they both felt they had come home.

Although they have never actually had a Graffham postal address before, the village is very much familiar turf to them. They lived close by for 21 happy years – over the A272 in Lodsworth from 1995 and then, from 2002, in a former barn and cow shed they converted from ruins in the hills above Easebourne.

During this time, their daughters Annie and Sophie attended Graffham Playgroup – Nella was a member of its committee at the time it moved from the Empire Hall to the village school in around 1998 – and on to Graffham Infants School itself before heading to Churcher's College in Petersfield.

Then in 2016, they tore themselves away from the beautiful home they had created at Lower Vining Barn, with its views towards Midhurst and across to Graffham Down, and moved to Loxwood to help Annie establish an equestrian business, living "on the job" in the farmhouse there.

It was in Graffham that Annie had caught the horse bug. Hannah Stickley became her very first friend at the playgroup, on the climbing frame in its Empire Hall days, and quickly invited her back home to Eastwood Stud to see the ponies there. And one thing led to another.... The Forsyth girls and Mum Nella became very involved with horses, Cowdray Pony Club and all things eventing – dressage, show jumping and cross country.

With Annie just turned 30 and due to marry in May this year, and with her horse enterprise trotting along very nicely, Ant and Nella felt, after seven years helping her hold the reins, that they could ease off and retire.

For him, that meant a real retirement, finally, having in 2019 given up his commute to the City after 40 years working in marine insurance underwriting at Lloyds. It can't have been too bad a career – for daughter Sophie, now 27, is following in her Dad's footsteps in the same sector, while living in Clapham, London. Ant and Nella

put their Loxwood house on the market last spring and quickly accepted an offer – on April Fool's Day! They looked at one or two properties that came onto the market here in Graffham, which didn't work out – but made them firmly decide "to come home".

Nella said: "It made me realise very quickly that this was the place I wanted to be. We would have loved to have moved here long ago, but it would have been too long a commute for Ant in those days before 'working from home'."

They had a family weekend away for a landmark birthday when the marketing details for the St Giles Place development came through and immediately booked a slot as early as they could on the viewing open day in late May – as one of around 100 potential purchasers to check the houses out that day.

The house they wound up buying was not on their target list originally. Nella explained: "It's something of a modern 'take' on a barn conversion and we had long said we weren't going to live in another barn. But it was the developer's show

home and we absolutely loved it. Its layout suits us better, and it has such an amazing outlook across the rural landscape that makes this area so special." Ant took up the theme: "After living in period properties, it's wonderful to be somewhere with no draughts, that's well insulated and where there's nothing requiring the attention of my non-existent DIY skills! The house was immaculate when we moved in – beautifully decorated and clean. There were just a few of the inevitable snagging issues you get with any new house, but nothing major and all put right by the developer."

As for many retirees who make this kind of move, though, it is quite a down-size for them after living on a 60-acre farm, so they had to dispose of a considerable amount of furniture and clutter built up since they married in 1987 in St Michael's Church, Betchworth, Surrey – which a few years later was the film set for one of the nuptials in the hit movie *Four Weddings And A Funeral*.

Nella had grown up in Betchworth and met Ant initially when she was 17. He was a few years older and friends with her eldest big brother, who he'd met through Reigate Rugby Club. But it was a few years later before he and Nella got together. He had been born in Formby, Lancashire, but at the age of three his family moved down to Walton-on-Thames, Surrey, and then to Reigate in 1970.

How have they found Graffham since moving? Nella said: "It feels like we've come full circle, returning home to the place we love. We received a lovely warm welcome from our neighbours and the many old friends who wonderfully are still here. We look forward to getting to know more residents as time goes on."

With several of their old friends lynchpins of St Giles' belltower, it didn't take much to persuade Nella to start learning the ropes, too. Anthony has joined the village gentlemen's 'Cardigan Club' midweek pub sessions, and the pair were to be found reeling at the Burns Night Celebration in the Empire Hall in January.

One of the village's great assets that they had not previously appreciated is the variety of walks it offers. They have been busy making up for that by exploring the neighbourhood's footpaths – many of which they find mysteriously end up at Heyshott's Unicorn pub! The terrain here is ideal too for Ant's mountain biking.

Soon, they plan to venture further afield. With a Volkswagen campervan on order, they aim to explore more of the UK and mainland Europe, starting with France and Italy.

But they will never be away for long. Graffham will be calling them home.

Introducing the Goodwood Education Trust

The Goodwood Education Trust is an independent charity operating on the Goodwood Estate. Established in 1976 by the 10th Duke of Richmond and Gordon, it promotes awareness and understanding of the natural environment to young people, particularly the disadvantaged.

Its principal areas of operation are Home Farm, the estate's working organic mixed farm, and Seeley Copse, a 20-acre area of semi-ancient woodland where the trust is based, in a purpose built Education Centre, opened in 2021. It works with children,

particularly the disadvantaged who may otherwise not have the opportunity to experience learning outdoors, strengthening their connection with food production and benefitting from the natural environment.

Countryside Stewardship Funding is helping the trust overcome barriers that schools face in getting their children learning outdoors. It is using these funds to invite schools

Holy Week in Graffham We travel through the events of Holy Week, following our Lord's journey to the Cross to bring hope to our world.

Sunday, 2 April 10.30am Palm Sunday Eucharist, St Giles Church Blessing of palms and dramatised reading of the Passion Story.

Thursday, 6 April Maundy Thursday Eucharist 7pm, followed by Watch of Prayer, St Giles Church Recalling the events in the Upper room, with our Lord's washing of the disciples' feet in humility and the institution of the Lord's Supper, followed by a Watch of Prayer.

Good Friday, 7 April All Saints Chapel 1pm and St Giles Church 2-3pm A reflective journey to keep vigil with readings and hymns until our Lord gives up his spirit on the Cross.



Sunday, 9 April 6am Easter Vigil and First Eucharist of Easter, St Giles – followed by breakfast This service is sometimes held in the evening before



Easter Day, sometimes at dawn on Easter Sunday. From a fire kindled in the churchyard, the Easter candle will be lit and carried into a darkened church, as a sign of Christ's light overcoming darkness in the world. We hear the Exsultet, an ancient song sung in the candlelight, before sharing in thanksgiving in our first Easter Eucharist of 2023.

Sunday, 9 April, 10.30am Easter Day Family Eucharist, St Giles A celebration of Easter hope, with our church decorated with flowers and followed by St Giles' traditional Easter Egg hunt in and around the churchyard.
